RECYCLING

Compact fluorescent bulbs Replacing your regular light bulbs with compact fluorescents (CFLs) can save you at least \$30 per bulb over a CFL's life, according to Consumer Reports. And the newest bulbs are even better. However, questions still persist over the differences and advantages between ordinary light bulbs and CFLs. Here are a few comparisons.

Recycling CFLs. Don't throw out used CFLs with your regular trash. Home Depot, Ikea, and some Ace and True Value stores accept unbroken CFLs no matter where you bought them. Wal-Mart is reportedly looking into a recycling program, but does not currently have one. You also can go www.ci.austin.tx.us/sws/disposal_a.htm for Austin Sold Waste Services' "How Do I Dispose Of" Directory of resources for drop-off locations throughout the city.

Cost. The cost of CFLs has gone down significantly over the years. Today, CFLs cost less than \$2. Some last five to 10 times as long as regular bulbs based on consumer tests, and Energy Star versions of the bulbs use as much as 75 percent less power. CFLS also have warranties that last up to nine years. To ensure you can use that warranty, if necessary, write the purchase date on the bulb in indelible ink and save your receipt.

Lighting differences. Previously, CFLs were thought to give off a blue-tinted light. However, many light like regular bulbs. The ones with a 2,700 to 3,000 Kelvin (K) number have a warmer, yellower color, while those with 3,500 K to 6,500 K produce a bluer or whiter light. Energy Star CFLs must include the Kelvin number on the package as of December. CFLs labeled "soft" or "warm" white will give you light like an incandescent, and "bright white," "natural," or "daylight" will emit a whiter light. Also, earlier CFLs used to flicker when they first lighted. Today, the new CFLs use faster, electronic ballasts instead of the previous magnetic ones. Many people believe

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

these CFL bulbs need time to turn on. In reality, turn-on is now nearly instantaneous. Most CFLs may take about 30 seconds to reach 80 percent of their brightness, and some flood and outdoor lights may take closer to two minutes. That brightening time may make some of the bulbs less than ideal for places like closets or stairways.

Chemical concerns. Each CFL bulb contains a tiny fraction of the mercury in a traditional thermometer. Additionally, Energy Star CFLs will soon have strict limits. Compact fluorescent light bulbs do not release mercury as they burn - the mercury is sealed inside the glass tubing. However, exposure to broken CFLs can be a health risk, especially if handled by women who are pregnant or young children. If you are exposed to a broken CFL, don't panic. The Environmental Protection Agency recommends that you open a window, turn off central air conditioning or forced-air heating, and clear the room for at least 15 minutes. After that, follow the EPA's cleanup guide at www.epa.gov/mercury/spills. To prevent any anxiety, be sure to keep CFLs out of lamps that could easily tip, especially in rooms used often by children or women who are pregnant. When CFLs burn out, they typically flicker, dim, or produce a reddish-orange glow. If one smokes or smolders, turn off power to the light, let the bulb cool before removing it, and then take it to a retailer or recycler.

Agency Web Site Helps Find Computer Recycling Locations


The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has a new statewide Web site for computer equipment recycling. Because computers and related equipment are a rapidly growing source of waste in Texas and the nation, the Web site offers Texans a simple way to find recycling options offered by their computer manufacturers.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that 53 million computers became obsolete last year, along with 35 million monitors and 82 million keyboards and mice. During its last regular session the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 2714, which requires computer manufacturers that sell in Texas to offer consumers convenient and free recycling of their equipment.

So please pass the word along to everyone who has a computer or handles the purchasing or disposal of computers in their workplace or school.

SLNA General Meeting Minutes for October 15, 2008

This meeting was held at the Skyline Terrace. The meeting was called to order by South Lamar (SLNA) Neighborhood Association President Nancy Maclaine at 7:07 p.m. SLNA officers present: Maclaine, Carol Gibbs, Krista Umscheid, John Bissell.

1) Bissell presented the Treasurer's Report: Checking Account Balance: \$941.74 Undeposited: \$ 0.00 Savings Account Balance: \$1,262.35 Two CDs Balance: \$2,280.97 Total Funds: \$4,485.06 Membership as of Aug. 21, 2008: 36 Membership at end of 2007: 63

2) SLNA officer elections were held. The slate was as follows: Nancy Maclaine unopposed for President. Krista Umscheid unopposed for Vice-President. David Ansel unopposed for Secretary. Sally Merritt unopposed for Treasurer. Carol Gibbs unopposed for ANC representative. The slate was unanimously elected. Carol Gibbs delivered her annual "we need new blood" speech and threatened that the neighborhood association was in danger of folding for a lack of neighborhood participation.

3) Alyssa Schramm, our neighborhood's community liaison from CapMetro, presented details on major CapMetro projects. Metrorail will run 32 miles through nine stations and begin service March 30, and function during commuter hours only. Metrorapid, another upcoming project, has express super-size buses that can communicate with traffic lights to make them 25 percent faster. There was some discussion of bus stops serving the neighborhood on South Lamar Boulevard and we asked about moving the southbound stop closer to the light at Bluebonnet Lane.

4) Discussion of Proposition 2, the "End Domain Subsidies" vs. "Keep Austin's Word" battle. Brian Rogers presented a video in support of his proposition. Carl, from Austin City Councilman Brewster McCracken's office described the dangers of passing Prop 2.

5) We discussed the future of the Sentinel (neighborhood newsletter), which is in danger of being cancelled by the printer for lack of advertising revenues. We discussed going to an all-e-mail version should that case arise.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:57 p.m. - David Ansel



National Road User Study

Currently, the United States Congress is funding a national road user study.

Austin is one of six areas in the country to field test an alternative way to help pay for roads and bridges. There is financial reimbursement for study participants; however, the study is in not commercial. Participants are compensated for participating in the study, which includes driving like they normally would, for a period of eight months. Currently, the gasoline tax (about 40 cents per gallon) helps fund the building and maintenance of America's roads and bridges. After 70 years, the gas tax is not meeting the increasing needs. This study is evaluating an approach based on the actual use of the roads and could eventually replace the gas tax. The study is funded by the U.S. Department of Transportation and is designed and conducted by the Public Policy Center at the University of Iowa.

To participate in the study, you must:

- * Have a valid driver's license
- * Be 18 years of age or older
- * Be a U.S. citizen
- * Own a personal automobile
- * Provide proof of vehicle registration
- * Provide proof of current insurance
- * Live in one of the selected field test sites:
 - o San Diego, CA
 - o Austin, TX
 - o Baltimore, MD

o Research Triangle in North Carolina including Durham, Raleigh, and Chapel Hill

o Boise, ID

o Eastern Iowa (Delaware, Dubuque, Linn, Jones, Jackson, Cedar, Clinton, Muscatine and Scott counties.

* Plan to reside in the area for at least the next 10 months

* Record the number of gallons of gas you buy each time you refuel

If you meet these requirements and are interested in being part of the Road User Study, please complete the on-line survey to get started. Once you have completed the survey, a member of the study team will contact you if you are selected to participate in the Road User Study.

Participants will be paid \$300 after completing the training session and having the on-board computer installed in their vehicle. The monthly compensation will be \$40 per month for 8 months. Participants will be paid a final compensation of \$275 after completing the exit interview and having the on-board computer removed from their vehicle. The total compensation for completing all study requirements is \$895.
